SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES (IN ORDER OF FIRST AGENDA APPEARANCE)

RT. HON. LORD ROBERTSON OF PORT ELLEN KT GCMG

Lord (George) Robertson is Chairman of the FIA Foundation, and led the international 'Make Roads Safe' campaign for ten years as Chairman of the Commission for Global Road Safety. He was NATO Secretary General from 1999-2003 and UK Defence Secretary from 1997-1999. He was Member of Parliament for Hamilton and then Hamilton South from 1978-1999. In 1993 he was elected to the Shadow Cabinet and served as Principal Opposition Spokesman on Scotland (the Shadow Secretary of State for Scotland). He is Special Adviser to BP, Chairman of BP Russian Investments Ltd and Senior Counselor at The Cohen Group (USA) and Chairman of the Ditchley Foundation. In 2004 he was personally appointed by the Queen as one of the sixteen Knights of the Thistle (KT), and awarded the GCMG (Knight Grand Cross of the Order of St Michael and St George). In 2011 he was appointed Chancellor of that Order. He was awarded the US Presidential Medal of Freedom, America's top civilian honour, in 2003, and has been awarded the highest national honours from many countries.

SADIQ KHAN

Sadiq Khan is Mayor of London. He was born in London and has lived here all his life. His parents moved to London from Pakistan in the 1960s. He was state-school educated in Tooting before studying Law at the University of North London. Sadiq and his wife have two daughters. Sadiq became a solicitor specialising in human rights and was a councillor in the London Borough of Wandsworth from 1994 to 2006. In 2005 Sadiq was elected MP for Tooting. He was appointed Minister of State for Communities in 2008 and later became Minister of State for Transport, becoming the first Muslim and first Asian to attend Cabinet. He was also Crossrail Minister. In 2013 Sadiq was appointed Shadow Minister for London, and in 2015 he led the Labour Party campaign in London in the General Election. Sadiq is a big sports fan, especially football, boxing and cricket. He ran the 2014 London Marathon, raising money for the Evening Standard's Dispossessed Fund.

MOHAMMED ADJEI SOWAH

Mayor Mohammed Adjei Sowah is Metropolitan Chief Executive for the Accra Metropolitan Assembly (AMA). He took up office in 2017, elected by the AMA following nomination by President Akufo-Addo of Ghana. Mayor Sowah is a Social Entrepreneur with over 23 years of work in local economic development especially in the area of informal economies and small business development. He was the Founder & Executive Director of the Social Enterprise Agenda. He also founded MAS Investments Ltd, a Company which provides a wide range of business solutions including small business management, general investments and business franchising. Mayor Sowah serves on the Advisory Board of The Beyond Aid Project, a social enterprise that builds capacity for young vulnerable women in rural and urban poor communities to add value to locally available raw materials for their economic empowerment. Mayor Sowah holds an MSc in Local Economic Development from the Institute of Local Government Studies, Ghana.

JEAN TOD

Jean Todt is President of the Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile (FIA). He was elected in 2009 and re-elected in 2013. He made road safety a priority of the federation through the FIA Action for Road Safety campaign, launched in 2011 in support of the UN Decade of Action for Road Safety. In 2015 he was appointed by UN Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon as his Special Envoy for Road Safety and in 2017 he was re-confirmed by the new UN Secretary General António Guterres. Jean Todt is a member of the Board of Trustees of the FIA Foundation; and one of the Founders, and the Vice-President, of ICM, an institute devoted to medical research for brain and spinal cord disorders. Jean Todt began his career in 1966 as a world championship rally co-driver, before joining Peugeot as Sporting Director in 1981. In 1993, he joined Ferrari Racing, later taking responsibility for all motor sport activity for the Ferrari-Maserati Group. He was appointed General Manager of Ferrari in 2004 and at the end of 2006 became Chief Executive Officer of the company until 2008. In 2011, Jean Todt was named Grand Croix de la Légion d'Honneur, the highest honour of the French Republic.

FERNANDO GARCÍA CASAS

Fernando García Casas was appointed as State Secretary for International Cooperation and for Ibero-America & the Caribbean at Spain's Council of Ministers on 2 December 2016. After joining the diplomatic corps in 1983, he was posted to the Permanent Representation to the Council of Europe in Strasbourg, then to the Spanish Embassy in Israel and the Permanent Representation to the United Nations in Geneva. Between 1992 and 2000, he was a diplomatic adviser to the International Department of the Cabinet Office of the Presidency of the Government, firstly, responsible for the Maghreb, the Middle East and Asia, and then, responsible for Ibero-American Affairs and the United Nations. During this time, he was also an associate professor in International Public Law at the Complutense University of Madrid and the Carlos III University. In May 2000, he was appointed as Director of the Department of International Studies and Relations of the Cabinet Office of the Presidency of the Government, running 20 departments of information and coordinating information from the European Councils. In July 2002, he joined the Secretariat for Ibero-American Cooperation in charge of communication. In 2005, he became the Assistant Director of the Cabinet Office of the Ibero-American Secretariat-General and headed up the office as from 2008. In 2014, he was appointed as the Spanish Ambassador to the Republic of Estonia, a post he held until 3 December 2016, when he was appointed as the State Secretary for International Cooperation and for Ibero-America. Born in Madrid in 1957, he holds a degree in Law and a degree in Philosophy and Literature. He holds a Diploma from the College of Europe (Bruges) and was awarded a Master of Arts from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy in Boston.

DR MARÍA NEIRA

Dr Neira is the Director of the Department of Public Health and Environment at the World Health Organization (WHO). Previously, between September 2002 and August 2005, she was President of the Spanish Food Safety Agency and Vice Minister of Health and Consumer Affairs in Spain. Dr Neira was appointed in 1999 as Director of the Department of Control, Prevention and Eradication at WHO. Prior to that, Dr Neira had been working for WHO in Geneva since 1993, as Coordinator of the Global Task Force on Cholera Control. Before joining WHO, Dr Neira worked as Public Health Adviser in the Ministry of Health in Mozambique from 1991 to 1993. Earlier, in Kigali, Rwanda, she was a UN Public Health Advisor/Physician on assignment from the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). From 1987 to 1989, Dr Neira was in Salvador and Honduras as Medical Coordinator for Médecins sans Frontières. Dr Neira started her professional career with three years in endocrinology and nutrition in the Necker Hospital and Hôpital Saint Louis in Paris from 1984 to 1987. Among other distinctions, Dr Neira has been awarded the Médaille de l'Ordre national du Mérite by the Government of France.

NAYSÁN SAHBA

Naysán Sahba was appointed as Director of UN Environment's Division of Communications and Public Information in January 2014. Throughout the 17 years of his professional career, which includes assignments with WHO and UNICEF in Africa and Asia, Mr. Sahba has been engaged in significant communication, advocacy, partnership and participation programmes in a wide range of domains related to sustainable development, such as health, education, climate change and disaster risk reduction. From 2009 to 2013, he served as UNICEF's Chief of Communication, Advocacy, Partnerships and Participation in Mozambique. Prior, Mr. Sahba worked in India with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, supporting communication for immunization interventions in the state of Uttar Pradesh – one of the final frontiers in India's successful fight against wild poliovirus. In 2005 he transferred to UNICEF India's Delhi office from where he spearheaded UNICEF's entertainment-education programmes. Mr. Sahba began his communication for development career working with indigenous community radio stations in Latin America and producing multimedia content about sustainable approaches to development.

ZOLEKA MANDELA

Zoleka Mandela is a writer, activist and Nelson Mandela's granddaughter. She is chair of the Zoleka Mandela Foundation; and Global Ambassador for the Child Health Initiative, an international partnership coordinated by the FIA Foundation. Since the death of her 13 year old daughter, Zenani, in a car crash in 2010, Zoleka has become a prominent advocate for safer roads, and gave the opening speech at the 2015 Brasilia High Level Conference on Road Safety, alongside President of Brazil Dilma Roussef and WHO Director General Margaret Chan. In 2016 she was chosen as one of the BBC's '100 Women', which names 100 influential and inspirational women around the world every year. In 2013 she published her autobiography, which detailed the challenges of her childhood; battling addiction; and surviving cancer.

SAUL BILLINGSLEY

Saul Billingsley is Executive Director of the FIA Foundation. He is a Trustee of the International Road Assessment Programme (iRAP); and a member of the Board of Directors of Safe Kids Worldwide, a US-based non-profit working for child injury prevention. He served as a member of the Executive Board of the World Bank's Global Road Safety Facility from 2013-2016; on the Executive Committee of the Global Road Safety Partnership (GRSP) from 2007-2013, and was a Trustee of the UK Road Safety Foundation from 2008-2013. Saul was Deputy Director of the FIA Foundation from 2004-2013, a key member of the team which devised the Make Roads Safe campaign and the UN Decade of Action for Road Safety; and its first Programmes Director from 2001-2004. He began his career working in the UK parliament, following a Postgraduate Diploma in Journalism from Cardiff University.

MARK WATTS

Mark Watts serves as the Executive Director for C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group. Prior to joining C40, Mark was the Director of Arup's energy consulting team based in London. Focused on cities and sustainability, he led Arup's partnership with the C40 group of cities committed to tackling climate change. Prior to joining Arup as a Director in 2008, he was the climate change and sustainable transport adviser to the Mayor of London, in which role the London Evening Standard described him as "the intellectual force behind Ken Livingstone's drive to make London a leading light of the battle against global warming." He led the development of London's ground-breaking Climate Change Action Plan and the associated programme of projects to reduce London's carbon emissions by 60% by 2025. Mark is a member of the Yale Climate Dialogue and is a member of the Advisory Group at WRI's Ross Center for Sustainable Cities.

ANUMITA ROYCHOWDHURY

Anumita Roychowdhury is Executive Director - Research and Advocacy and head of the air pollution and clean transportation programme at the Centre for Science and Environment (CSE), based in New Delhi, India. She campaigns for clean air and public health and has researched and written widely on these topics. She co-authored the book `Slow Murder: The deadly story of vehicular pollution in India' in 1996 that catalysed the clean air campaign in CSE. She authored a second book 'The Leapfrog Factor: Clearing the Air in Asian Cities' in 2006 to launch the second generation of action in cities. She has published numerous articles and contributed to the series on Citizens Report on the State of India's Environment. She has also served on national and international committees on air pollution and transportation related matters.

KEVIN WATKINS

Kevin Watkins is Chief Executive of Save the Children UK. He joined Save the Children in September 2016, after spending three years as Executive Director of the Overseas Development Institute. Previously, he held a senior academic role at the Brookings Institution, and acted as an adviser to the UN Special Envoy for Education, before which he spent seven years at the United Nations, as director and lead author of UNESCO's Education for All Global Monitoring Report and UNDP's Human Development Report. He is a senior visiting research fellow at Oxford University's Centre for Global Economic Governance and a Visiting Professor of International Development at the London School of Economics.

MIKE PENROSI

Mike Penrose has been Executive Director of Unicef UK since May 2016. He was previously CEO of Action Contre Le Faim in Paris, and Global Humanitarian Director at Save the Children International. He is a senior leader with a track record in the commercial, humanitarian, development and international sectors, and over 17 years experience working for NGOs and DFID. Mike's experience of crisis and emergency response is extensive and has included consultant deployments as Head of Operations for the UN WHO in Banda Aceh for the Tsunami response, DFID Operations Advisor for the Pakistan earthquake in 2005 and the Evacuation Team Leader for the inter-governmental civilian evacuations of Lebanon in 2006, Guinea in 2007, and DR Congo also in 2007.

DR NHAN TRAN

Dr. Nhan Tran is the Coordinator of the Unintentional Injury Prevention Team (UIP) within the Department for Management of Noncommunicable Diseases, Disability, Violence and Injury Prevention (NVI) at the World Health Organization. He co-ordinates work in the areas of unintentional injury prevention (focused mainly on road safety), injury surveillance/surveys and alcohol and drug-related injuries. Dr. Tran brings a multi-disciplinary and systems' perspective to the field of injury prevention from his 20 years' experience as an educator, community activist, researcher, and civil servant. He has worked in diverse settings around the world and has contributed a wide range of activities, from the establishment of surveillance systems in Afghanistan to the analysis of policies to prevent road traffic deaths in Southeast Asia. For the last 6 years, he was the Manager of the Alliance for Health Policy and Systems Research within WHO where he lead the development of guidance and initiatives to facilitate the implementation and scale up of proven effective interventions.

RHODA STEEL

Rhoda Steel is Head of UK Corporate Social Responsibility for Johnson & Johnson. Rhoda joined Johnson & Johnson in 2007 and since 2011 has led the Cross-Sector CSR programme across the family of UK companies. She was responsible for setting up and shaping the programme in response to external needs of the UK community healthcare environment and currently manages the group's strategic partnerships with charities and social enterprises. She also leads the UK Employee Volunteering programme and represents Johnson & Johnson externally in this capacity. Prior to this, she was Johnsons Baby Senior Brand Manager in UK Consumer. Before joining Johnson & Johnson Rhoda worked in Petcare Marketing for Mars Inc after graduating from the Mars Management Development Programme. She is a Cambridge University graduate.

AVI SILVERMAN

Avi Silverman is Deputy Director of the FIA Foundation. Avi has also worked for UNICEF as the Global Coordinator of UNICEF's Child Road Traffic Injury Prevention programme. In this role he has coordinated UNICEF's global advocacy on child road traffic injury and has managed programming worldwide. He has played a prominent role in the FIA Foundation-led coalition which successfully advocated for the inclusion of road safety in the UN's Post-2015 Sustainable Development Goals. Avi also serves as a Trustee of the UK's Road Safety Foundation. Prior to joining the FIA Foundation, Avi was a Public Affairs Manager for the Local Government Association (LGA) of England and Wales. Previously, he worked as a journalist, commissioned by The Guardian newspaper in the UK and the Ha'aretz/International Herald Tribune in Israel. Avi has a Master's degree in International Relations from Cambridge University, a Postgraduate Diploma in journalism from City University London, and a BA in Modern History from Oxford University.

JORGE OLAGUE

Jorge Olague is UNICEF Global Fundraising Director. He started his career in the private sector, working for over ten years in General Motors Europe, in the areas of marketing and business development. In 2004 Jorge joined the World Food Program in Rome, where he specialised in private sector engagement and was appointed Head of Corporate Partnerships in 2010. He joined UNICEF in 2011 as Regional Chief of Private Fundraising and Partnerships, Latin America, in Panama. In July 2014 he was appointed UNICEF Global Fundraising Director, in Geneva. In this role he leads the global private sector resource mobilization efforts for UNICEF, working together with UNICEF's thirty four National Committees, Country Offices, donors and corporate partners to make a positive difference for the world's children. Jorge has a Master's degree in Economics, University of Zaragoza (Spain). Jorge Olague is Spanish and lives with his wife and two daughters in Geneva.

FRANCISCO REYNÉS MASSANET

Francisco Reynés Massanet has been Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Abertis Infraestructuras since 2010. In 2015, he was appointed Vice-Chairman of the company. As a representative of Abertis Infraestructuras, he is a member of the Board of Directors of Sanef in Paris, Arteris in Sao Paulo, Hispasat in Madrid, Autopista Central in Chile, among others. Since 2015, he is also Chairman of Cellnex Telecom. Before joining Abertis, Francisco Reynés was Managing Director of Criteria CaixaCorp, La Caixa's business holding. In this role, he oversaw the company's stock market listing in October 2007. Previously he has also been a member of the Board of Directors of Gas Natural Fenosa, Aguas de Barcelona, Segur CaixaHolding, Boursorama, Adeslas and Port Aventura. He holds a degree in Industrial engineering, specializing in mechanical engineering, from the University of Barcelona and an MBA from IESE. In addition, he has attended Senior Management courses in the USA and Germany. He was born in Mallorca in 1963 and he is married, with five children.

JAVIER MARTOS MOTA

Javier Martos Mota is Executive Director of UNICEF Spain. Born in Madrid, he holds a bachelor's degree in Political Science and a Master Degree in Cooperation for Development. He joined UNICEF in 1999 as Project Officer of Public Policy in Mexico. In 2003 he came back to Spain to join the Spanish National Committee for UNICEF. Between 2006 and 2008 he became responsible for the Department of Cooperation and Emergencies supporting the relationship between UNICEF, the Spanish Government and the National Committee. In 2008 he was appointed as Director of Regional Territories for the Spanish National Committee being responsible for the design, monitoring and evaluation of the annual work plan in the Spanish Regions. In March 2013 he was appointed as Executive Director of UNICEF Spanish National Committee. He is also a member of the UNICEF Standing Group of National Committees. Maria (Nani) Fernanda Rodríguez is President of the Fundación Gonzalo Rodríguez, a Uruguyan non-governmental organisation working on child safety across Latin America. Following the death of Nani's brother, racing driver Gonzalo 'Gonchi' Rodriguez, the Fundación Gonzalo Rodríguez was created in October 2000, at the initiative of Nani, Gonzalo's friends and fans, who believed that Gonchi's achievements were not to be lost, and that with his same energy and enthusiasm a better world for future generations could be built. Nani has also served as Chairman of the Latin New Car Assessment Programme, which undertakes independent crash tests.























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
